
Brethren,

To get right to the point, here they are:

International Order of Jobs Daughters

International Order of Jobs Daughters is an organization dedicated to preparing young women to lead successful, happy, and productive lives. Girls between the ages 10 through 20 who have a Masonic, Eastern Star or Majority Member relation are eligible to join. They have meetings in what is called a Bethel. Girls learn leadership, public speaking, self discipline, and have a lot of fun. They attend many functions, including leadership camp, Grand Bethel, ritual competition, and many local activities. They support education, churches, hospitals, and many other charities. They have many scholarship opportunities available through the California and Supreme Guardian Councils for college bound girls. Meetings are held the first and third Monday at Greenleaf Masonic Center at 07:00pm.

International Order of Rainbow Girls

For girls ages 11 through 20 who have a sponsored Masonic, Eastern Star, or Amaranth relation, or is sponsored by an active Rainbow girl. They have meetings in what is called an assembly. Girls learn public churches, hospitals, and many other charities. They have many scholarships available through the California Grand Assembly for college bound girls.

Meetings are held the second and fourth Tuesday at Golden Trowel Lodge - Norwalk

Brethren:

At the February Stated Meeting several annual reports were presented to the Lodge as required by the California Masonic Code. The Lodge has been impacted to some extent by the overall economic downturn and by the general decline in lodge membership. However we are monitoring our income and expenses carefully and are making adjustments where necessary.

Last September the Lodge approved an increase in the annual dues from \$45.00 to \$60.00 per year. This was the first increase in ten years and, at this point, there has been no negative reaction from the membership. Speaking of membership our total membership on January 1, 2008 totaled 234 and on December 31, 2008 it had dropped to 219. This continuing decline is a result of the substantial increases in membership in the post war 1950s and 1960s. A positive sign is that growth in our Lodge membership has shown an increase in the last few years but it is not large enough to compensate for the loss of these older members.

Another positive indicator is that the average age of applicants is declining and this is reflected in the age of our officers. The average age of the officers in the progressive line this year is 39.75 years. This compares to 1988, the year I was Worshipful Master, when the average age was 58.12 years. The younger officers are full of energy, ideas and enthusiasm. They are also eager to learn the duties of their present offices and to prepare for advancement to the next station.

On another subject, the menu this month restores a former tradition, that of having corned beef and cabbage, at the March Stated Meeting dinner. For those who don't like corned beef and cabbage, there are some, we will order you a chicken dinner providing you let me know by calling 562-695-2755 no later than 12:00 noon on Monday March 2nd.
